From 26 Nov 65 through 22 Mar 67, I was in the following, UMAP /Military Unit for the Assistance of Production/ camps in Camaguay Province:

a. From 26 Nov 65 to 26 May 66, I was with the 1st Company, 24th Battalion of MIN 1889 (6th Group), located about two miles north of Sola, Camaguey /approximate camp coordinates 2259857. This camp is known as Campo UMAP Finca la Ofelia. This camp has about 120 inmates who are actually prisoners forced to work in the cane fields. The camp is administered by two Cuban Army officers assisted by six sergeants. There is one political instructor (military) and six SMO recruits who serve as camp guards. Other UMAP camps in this general area are located as follows and are also subordinate to MIN 1889 (6th Group), 24th Battalion:

(1) 2nd Company - This unit is located about five miles west of Senado, Camaguey, on a farm called <u>la Esperanza</u> [approximate coordinates 285857].

(2) 3rd Company - This with is located in a camp about eight miles southeast of Sola, Camaguey in an area called <u>El Colorado</u>. Source could not locate area on map.7, with the company - This with is located in a camp about three kms northeast of Senado, Camaguey in an area known as <u>San Ignacio</u> (coordinates 3348657.

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2. From 26 May 66 to 16 Feb 67, I was stationed with the 4th Company, 25th Battalion (MIN 2506) at a farm known as Los Mameyes located about 22 kms northwest of Puerto Manati, Oriente. /Source could not locate this area on a map./ /See ENCLOSURE "A" for camp layout./ The 25th UMAP Battalion is composed of four companies, each with about 120 men for a total strength of about 500. About 30% of the personnel of this battalion suffered from diseases such as asthma, arthritis and heart ailments. Many of the seriously sick personnel have been admitted to the Provincial Hospital in Camaguey, treated and discharged from UMAP service. (See ENCLOSURE "A" for 4th Co, 25th Bn camp layout/

3. From 17 Feb 67 to 22 Mar 67, I was assigned to the 1st Company, 22nd UMAP Battalion (MIN 2237). This unit is located in a camp about 14 miles northeast of the Senado Sugar Mill, Camaguey, in an area known as Jagueycito. See ENCLOSURE "B" for camp layout. Source could not pinpoint location on map.7

a. The 1st Company, 22nd Battalion, has 120 personnel. All of these inmates were either accused of "living the good life", being unemployed, being uncooperative toward the GCC, being vagabonds, refusing to serve in the armedforces, being members of certain religious sects, or being homosexuals. Their ages range from 16 to 45 years, and they are paid Cuban \$7.00 a month.
b. The daily work schedule at this camp is as follows:

6500 = 0515Personal hygiene.0515 = 0530Breakfast.0530 = 0600Transportation to work area.0600 = ±100Work in sugar cane fields.

Rest period. 1100 - 1130 1130 - 1200 Lunch. 1200 - 1400 Rest period. 1400 - 1700 Work in sugar cane fields. 1700 - 1730 Return to camp. Personal hygiene. 1730 - 1800 1800 - 1900 Supper. 1900 - 2000 Rest period. 2000 - 2100 Political indoctrination class. 2100 Lights out.

Sunday is reserved for washing and mending clothes and sometimes playing volleyball or baseball. Once every third Sunday, relatives of the prisoners are allowed to visit.

c. Food served at this camp included the following:

(1) Breakfast - Coffee, milk and crackers.

(2) Lunch - Rice, a banana, malanga or yuca, sweet peas and water.

(3) Supper - Rice, Soviet canned meat, peas, water (fresh beef once a month).

The work at this camp as well as most other UMAP mamps includes cane cutting, fertilizing, working in vegetable fields, road regain, cutting timber, and planting tomatoes, oranges and other citrus fruits.

e. Treatment at this camp as well as the other UMAP camps I was assigned to was always harsh. The guards would insult us, beat us with the rifle butts, and make us kneel for long hours in the hot sun. This type of treatment continued until September 1966, when a remarkable change in the treatment occurred;* the stern discipline continued, but there were no more beatings or insults and we were treated more like human beings. According to the SMD personnel as-signed to this camp, the reason for the change was because of world opinion and the bad publicity these camps have received. Supposedly Castro himself gave orders to stop the beatings.

f. Security in this UMAP camp and the others in which I was detained is lax, since camp officials feel that if you escape, you will soon be caught. This particular camp had only a six foot (non-barbed) wire fence surrounding it.

g. The camp had two Army lieutenants, six sergeants, one political instructor assigned; there were six military draftees who served as camp guards. (A typical UMAP camp, or company as it is known, usually has this number of permenent personnel assigned.)

The following are the locations of the remaining companies of the 22nd Battalion (MIN 2237):

(1) 2nd Company - At Finca Ias Marias, Camaguey. Source could not locate site on map.7

(2) 3rd Company - About six kms northeast of Sola, Camaguey /coordinates 2880237. This camp is called Laguna Grande. All of its 120 inwates are known homosexuals.

(3) 4th Company - About six kms north of Sola, Caraguey, and is known as Finca la Atomica [coordinates 222058].

4. UMAP Organizational Structure.

The headquarters for the entire UMAP System is known as MIN 1015 and а. is located five blocks southeast of Casino Campestre, Camaguey City. UMAP Headquarters has about 20 Army officers, 20 enlisted personnel, one political instructor and several RC cell members assigned to it. Captain Quintin Ping Machado is commander of UMAP Headquarters. He is a FCC member.

\$\$ \$\$ ex_ 2 2 C 25 2 . USC b. Subordinate to the headquarters (MIN 1015) are six groups (agrupaciones) located in various cities in Camaguey Province. Each of these six groups has a military unit number. Each group has eight officers, 15 enlisted men, and one political indoctrinator. Source only knew MIN of unit to which he was assigned.7 There are five battalions assigned to each of the six groups. Each battalion has five Cuban Army officers, 10 enlisted men, one political instructor, and several FCC cell members assigned to it. Each of the five battalions has four companies or "UMAP Camps". Each company or camp has about 120 inmates. Each camp has two officers, six sergeants, one political instructor and six draftees. There is usually a PCC cell member assigned to each of the camps.

As of March 1967, there were about 20 thousand men assigned to the more than 160 UMAP camps throughout Camaguey Province. Another 50 camps are under construction in Camaguey Province, while others are to be constructed in Pinar del Rio Province.

5. The following identify the numbered buildings of FNCLOSURE "A"

1. Guard post with one guard armed with a M-52 Czech rifle,

2. Company Headquarters Building and dormitory for officers.

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3. Concrete barracks (40m X 10m X 5m), capacity 60 inmates.

4. Concrete barracks (20m X 10m X 5m) for sergeants and SMD's, capacity 30.

6. Concrete building (40m X 10m X 5m) used as the dining hall for all personnel including officers, NCO's, SMD's and inmates. The kitchen and the storeroom are also located in this building.

7. Two concrete water tanks, each with a 1,600 gallon capacity. (Each tank measures 12 meters in diameter and is 42 feet high.) The two tanks, are mounted on a 15' concrete platform; the entire structure (with tanks and platform), stands about 20 feet high.

8. A 10-thousand gallon water cistern. Water is brought by rail tank cars (the railroad line is located about two kms east of the camp) and dumped into the the cistern from which it is pumped by a small portable pump into the tanks.

9. Concrete building containing 10 latrines.

10. Concrete shower room with 10 shower nozzles.

The following items identify the numbered buildings of ENCLOSURE "B" :

1. Concrete barracks (40m X 10m X 5m), capacity 50 inmates.

2. Company Headquarters Building and dormitory for officers, sergeants and politicalinstructor.

3. Same as #17

4. Dining hall, kitchen and food warehouse. This is a concrete building (40m X 10m X 5m), capacity 50.

5. Two concrete water tanks, each with a 1,600 gallon capacity. The tanks are supported by three 15' concrete pillars. Water is pumped into the tanks from a well located directly below the tanks.

6. Latrine. (No showers are available in this camp, all personnel bathe in the Maximo River (canal) south of the camp.)

7. 22nd Battelion Headquarters Building (MIN 2237). Five officers, 10 enlisted men, one political instructor are assigned to the headquarters. This is an ordinary concrete structure equipped with a field phone. The Headquarters Building, as well as the entire camp, has no electricity: oil lamps provide light.

8. Concrete dormitory used for civilian personnel assigned to weigh sugar cane.

9. Building where scales, motors, etc., are maintained.


